The club reached the conference semifinals in 2024 and 2025, and Avery compiled a 39-18-12 record in USL League Two. ... Previously, Avery was head coach at Valparaiso University (2007-2020), an assistant coach at the University of Louisville (2006-2007), an assistant at the University of Notre Dame (2000-2006), head coach at Cal State San Bernardino (1997-1999), and head coach at Bethel University (1994-1996). He also served as the interim head coach at Trine University in 2024. ... As a player, he followed a standout career at Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California, with professional play for Real Santa Barbara, in Sweden for Askims IK, and with the Indiana Invaders in South Bend.



Keelan Barker has been an assistant coach with Fort Wayne Football Club since 2020. ... As head coach at Indiana Tech from 2024 to 2025, he had a 31-7-6 record and won two Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference Tournaments, reached two NAIA Tournaments, and qualified for the 2025 quarterfinals.

Broadcast Style Guide

These guidelines are intended to promote consistency across broadcasts and other media coverage. If questions arise before or during a match, please contact Fort Wayne Football Club Communications.

What is the preferred way to refer to the club?

On first reference, Fort Wayne Football Club is preferred. Fort Wayne FC is acceptable on subsequent references. Avoid abbreviating the club as FWFC during broadcasts.

How should the region be referenced?

Other than Fort Wayne, Northeast Indiana is the preferred geographic reference. Fort Wayne is also commonly known as The Summit City and, less frequently, The River City, referencing the confluence of the Maumee, St. Mary's and St. Joseph rivers.

What are the team colors?

Autumn Gold and Black. Complete brand standards are available at www.fortwaynefc.com/about-our-crest.

Does the team have a nickname?

The preferred nickname is "The Autumn Gold & Black." Please avoid creating or using unofficial team nicknames during broadcasts.

What is the name of the Supporters Group?

The Three Rivers Regiment, which occupies the supporters' section informally known as The Hive.

How should ownership be referenced?

Mark Music, Chief Executive Officer of Ruoff Mortgage, is the Majority Owner of Fort Wayne Football Club. DaMarcus Beasley, a Fort Wayne native and four-time FIFA World Cup participant, is a Co-owner and the Director of Football Operations.

In which league did the club previously compete?

Fort Wayne Football Club was founded in 2019 and began play in 2021 in USL League Two, a pre-professional league. The club competed there through the 2025 season before moving to USL League One, a professional league, in 2026. The transition included a comprehensive rebrand featuring new logos, colors and brand standards.

Is there a mascot?

Friendly the Goalrilla. Acceptable references include Friendly or The Goalrilla. More information is available at fortwaynefc.com/thegoalrilla. He was first introduced on July 4, 2026, at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium.

How should the stadium be referred to?

Ruoff Mortgage Stadium is the preferred name. 6411 Bass Road is the address and also an informal way to refer to the grounds. Many also refer to the stadium as The Ru. The stadium was 100% privately funded by the club is operated within a multiyear naming rights partnership with Ruoff Mortgage.

In 2024, when he had seven goals and two assists, he played every minute of every match for Atlanta United 2. ... After spending his youth career with Deportivo La Coruña, Armas moved to the United States to attend Oregon State University, for which he played from 2019 to 2023. He appeared in 77 matches throughout his college career – starting 71 of them – and finished with six goals and 10 assists. As a senior, he was selected First Team All-Pac 12, and he was selected to the United Soccer Coaches' All-American Third Team. Oregon State reached the national semifinals in 2023 before falling 1-0 to Notre Dame. ... Armas was selected by Atlanta United in the second round of the 2023 MLS SuperDraft.

2026 Highlights

Assisted on first goal in Fort Wayne FC's pro history, scored by Lilian Ricol, in a 2-2 draw at the Sarasota Paradise on March 14. ... Assisted on another Ricol goal early in club's first ever Prinx Tires USL Cup match, a 3-1 loss at Louisville City FC on April 25. ... Named to bench of USL League One Team of the Week on May 5, 2026. ... Named bench player on USL League One Team of the Week on May 26, 2026.

Had a stellar 2025 season for the University of Central Florida, which won the first Sun Belt title in program history. The school reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament. ... Awoudor made the United Soccer Coaches' Division I All-America Third Team and the All-Southeast Region First Team, was named to the Sun Belt Conference's First Team and All-Tournament Team, and he set UCF's single-season assist record with 15. He played complete matches 17 times and finished with seven goals in 21 matches as a senior. ... Awoudor finished his U.S. college career with 17 goals and 28 assists in 66 matches over four years, including one season at Oregon State, 2022, in which he had three goals and two assists in 13 matches and was named to the All-Pac-12 First Team. He was also named to College Soccer News' All-Freshman Third Team. In 2023, Awoudor was selected the Sun Belt Conference's Newcomer of the Year after tallying four goals and four assists in 16 matches for UCF. ... Prior to playing college soccer in the U.S., Awoudor was an academy player for five years with SM Caen, a professional club in Normandy, France.

Aye joined Fort Wayne Football Club on an academy contract July 11, 2026, becoming the youngest player, at age 16, to join the roster since the club ascended to professional soccer this year. ... Aye, one of the area's brightest talents, has an impressive résumé that includes a match with Fort Wayne FC during 2025 in USL League Two, a pre-professional tier. When Aye entered an international friendly against Atlas Fútbol Club's Sub-23 roster on June 28, 2025, at age 15, he became the youngest player to take the field in the Fort Wayne FC's five seasons of play at that level. ... Aye will be a junior at Northrop High School in the fall of 2026. ... He spent the previous two seasons at North Side High School and was a First Team All-Conference selection in the Summit Athletic Conference. ... Aye spent seven years playing locally for Fort Wayne United and spent one season, his U-14 year, in the Indy Eleven Academy system. ... Good performances with Fort Wayne United in 2022 eventually led to an invitation to play in the Elite Academy League in Spain and he also had trials in the Netherlands with PSV Eindhoven. ... He also played for the U.S. Youth Futsal National Team in 2022 and 2026, which took him to Argentina and England, respectively.

2026 Highlights: Checked into July 18, 2026, match against Greenville Triumph SC, a 3-0 Fort Wayne FC victory, and became the youngest player to appear in a match since club became a professional team. Aye also holds club record for youngest player to appear in a match regardless of level; he was 15 when he took the field in 2025 in USL League Two.

Ryan Becher completed the 2025 season with Union Omaha of USL League One, totaling nine goals and three assists in 22 matches. He was on loan from MLS Next Pro side St. Louis City SC 2. ... In 2024, with St. Louis City SC 2, he played in 31 matches and scored two goals with four assists, and he added one goal and one assist in 11 matches during 2025 with the club. ... Becher played at UCLA in 2023 and appeared in 15 matches, starting 13 of them, scoring six goals with two assists. ... Began his college career at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, in 2019. He accrued 25 goals and 20 assists over 62 matches – all starts – in the span of four years. With the Retrievers, he was selected to the “Best Starting XI” in Division I soccer by NCAA.com in 2022, when he also made the America East First Team and the United Soccer Coaches Northeast Conference Second Team. He was the only player in the country that season to post double-digit figures in goals (13) and assists (10). ... Becher won back-to-back high-school championships in Pennsylvania during 2016 and 2017. ... Becher’s father, Bill, played for the Fort Wayne Flames and the Indiana Kick, professional teams in the American Indoor Soccer Association that competed at Memorial Coliseum, from 1987 to 1990. ... Bill and Ryan’s grandfather, Bill Becher Sr., are members of the St. Louis Soccer Hall of Fame. Ryan’s brother, Jackson, was a teammate at UMBC. And his cousin, Simon, played in Major League Soccer for St. Louis City in 2025.

2026 Highlights: Scored third goal of season, and second in USL League One play, in 1-all draw at Forward Madison on June 17, 2026. The draw extended Fort Wayne FC’s unbeaten streak to nine matches, tied for the third longest run by a first-year club in USL League One history.

Dias spent three seasons starring for Fort Wayne FC at the pre-professional level. He helped Fort Wayne FC to division titles in the summers of 2023, 2024 and 2025, and to conference semifinals in

2024 and 2025. ... Dias captained the club in 2024 and 2025. In Fort Wayne FC's USL League Two history, which spanned five seasons, Dias ranked second in total matches played with 38 and fourth in goals with six. ... Dias played in the fall of 2025 for Bryant University in Smithfield, Rhode Island, during which he earned Second Team All-America East and Second Team All-Northeast Region honors. He played a pivotal role in a defense that had 11 clean sheets, and he assisted on five goals in 21 matches. Bryant finished the NCAA Division I season ranked 10th in the nation, falling to Saint Louis in penalty kicks in the third round of the national championships. ... Dias played locally for Indiana Tech in 2024, scoring five goals and earning nods as a NAIA Third Team All-American, Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference Defender of the Year, First Team All-WHAC, and WHAC Newcomer of the Year. Dias captained the Warriors. ... From 2022 to 2023, Dias played at the University of Albany in Albany, New York. In 2021, he played for Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kansas.

Captained Fort Wayne Football Club in its first professional match, a 2-0 loss at FC Naples on March 7. ... Scored first professional goal against Corpus Christi FC at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium on May 20, 2026. Goal came on a header after a Javier Armas corner kick. Match ended 1-1. ... Named bench player on USL League One Team of the Week on May 26, 2026.

AURIE ECHEVARRÍA

Goalkeeper Aurie Echevarría was one of Fort Wayne Football Club's most successful players from the team's time in pre-professional soccer. He helped propel Fort Wayne FC to three straight Valley Division titles in USL League Two between 2023 and 2025, and the club reached the Conference Semifinals in 2024 and 2025. ... In 2023, he won the Golden Glove Award for having the lowest goals-against average in USL League Two at 0.43 goals per 90 minutes. He had a run of eight straight scoreless matches for Fort Wayne FC that year. ... In 2025, Echevarría was named to the Central Conference Team of the Year, after he helped Fort Wayne FC to seven clean sheets. Echevarría had a three-save performance against Kings Hammer FC Cincinnati on July 12, when Fort Wayne FC clinched the Valley Division title with a 1-0 victory. ... Echevarría played 34 matches with Fort Wayne FC in USL League Two, which ranked third in club history behind only defenders Reid Sproat (50) and Tiago Dias (38). ... Echevarría played in the fall of 2025 at Butler University as a graduate student. He appeared in 17 matches and had a 5-10-2 record with two clean sheets, a .659 save percentage and a 1.82 goals-against average. ... Prior to Butler, Echevarría played at Rutgers University from 2021 to 2024 and was part of the 2022 Big Ten championship team. He played in eight matches and was 3-4-1 with a shutout, a .553 save percentage and a 2.13 goals-against average. ... Before his college career, Echevarría helped St. Benedict's Prep to two national titles.

2026 Highlights

Started and played entirety of Fort Wayne Football Club's first professional match, stopping 1 of 3 shots on net in a 2-0 loss at FC Naples on March 7. ... Called to Puerto Rico's National Team on March

16. Third time in his career he's been called to the National Team. However, due to an injury suffered in Fort Wayne FC training, Echevarría was unable to join Puerto Rico for series. ... Echevarría wins Save of the Round, from Round 3 of the Prinx Tires USL Cup, for a save against Union Omaha. ... Finalist for Save of the Round, from Round 4 of the Prinx Tires USL Cup, for a save against Detroit City FC.

Kabiru Gafar was He was with Indy Eleven of USL Championship during the 2026 preseason and scored twice in friendlies. ... Gafar played the past four years at the University of Indianapolis, appearing in 66 matches, starting 46 of them, and totaling 11 goals and 13 assists. In 2025, he had four goals and five assists in 19 matches, starting all but one, and the Greyhounds reached the second round of the NCAA Division II Tournament. ... With the University of Indianapolis, Gafar was the Great Lakes Valley Conference's Freshman of the Year in 2022, when he had three goals and two assists in 18 matches, and was also named Third Team All-GLVC. He was Academic All-GLVC in 2023, 2024 and 2025. ... Gafar played two seasons at Indianapolis' Ben Davis High School before joining the Indy Eleven Academy and helping it to back-to-back USL Academy Cup championships. In 2021, he won the Golden Boot as the highest scorer of the tournament with three goals and an assist. ... Gafar immigrated from Nigeria to Indianapolis when he was 11.

2026 Highlights: Assisted on goals in four of six matches between May 16 and June 10. ... Our Name

We will be primarily known as Fort Wayne Football Club.

March 7, 2026: In 2-0 loss at FC Naples, which was Fort Wayne Football Club's first match in pro soccer, a whopping 10 players made their professional debuts: Aurie Echevarría, Tiago Dias, Reid Sproat, Anthony Hernandez, Taig Healy, Lilian Ricol, Jayden Smith, Trace Terry, Clarence Awoudor, and Michael Rempel.

March 14, 2026: Fort Wayne FC's first goal in the professional ranks is scored by Lilian Ricol in the 30th minute of a match at the Sarasota Paradise. Ryan Becher also scores, with the assist going to Ricol, and Fort Wayne FC gets its first standings point in professional soccer with a 2-all tie.

March 16, 2026: Goalkeeper Aurie Echevarría is named to Puerto Rico's National Team for FIFA Series. It's the third time he's been named to the National Team. *(Due to an injury suffered in a subsequent Fort Wayne FC practice, Echevarría was unable to join Puerto Rico for series.)*

March 19, 2026: Bernd Schipmann wins Save of the Week in USL League One for a save against the Sarasota Paradise.

April 11, 2026: Taig Healy scores 44 seconds into match – establishing a new club record regardless of league – and Fort Wayne FC gets its first victory in professional soccer, 1-0 at the Chattanooga Red Wolves SC. Bernd Schipmann has two saves for the 28th clean sheet of his USL League One Career – fourth most in league history.

April 17, 2026: Taig Healy's goal against Chattanooga Red Wolves is voted Goal of the Week in USL League One.

April 25, 2026: Fort Wayne FC briefly held lead in first ever Prinx Tires USL Cup match, thanks to a Lilian Ricol goal, but Louisville City FC ended up winning 3-1. Lou City was atop USL Championship standings at time of the match.

May 2, 2026: Fort Wayne FC opens its new stadium, Ruoff Mortgage Stadium, in front of 4,000 spectators and plays the Charlotte Independence to a 2-2 draw. Taig Healy opened the scoring in the fourth minute. Jayden Smith put Fort Wayne FC up 2-1 in the 10th minute

May 6, 2026: Fort Wayne FC gets first victory at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium with a 3-0 victory over Portland Hearts of Pine that included two Lilian Ricol goals and a Taig Healy goal in the second half. Bernd Schipmann assisted on a goal and had a four-save clean sheet in front of 2,389 fans

May 9, 2026: Fort Wayne FC defeats Westchester SC 1-0 to improve to 2-0-1 at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium. Taig Healy scores in a fourth straight league match and Bernd Schipmann has second straight clean sheet

May 16, 2026: The first running of the Victory & Liberty Derby, a Prinx Tires USL Cup match between Fort Wayne FC and Indy Eleven, winds up tied 2-2 and then goes to penalty kicks, where Indy Eleven scored three of the four goals at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium. Fort Wayne FC's Taig Healy scored in regulation time for his fifth goal in six matches in all competitions. Jack Thomas' first professional goal, in stoppage time, forced the PKs.

May 23, 2026: Lilian Ricol has his second two-goal game of the season, and Taig Healy scores for the sixth match in the span of eight regardless of competition, and Fort Wayne FC wins 3-1 at Athletic Club Boise. Fort Wayne FC is unbeaten in six straight USL League One matches (3-0-3). Ricol is clocked during the match at a top speed of 24.8 mph, which would make him among the fastest players in the world.

May 30, 2026: Fort Wayne FC extends unbeaten streak in USL League One play to seven matches with scoreless draw with AV Alta FC at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium. Bernd Schipmann's clean sheet was the 31st of his USL League One career, putting him into a tie for third place all-time with Akira Fitzgerald.

June 8, 2026: Taig Healy wins the fan vote for USL League One Player of the Month (May), but he ultimately finishes second for the award to Ollie Wright of the Portland Hearts of Pine, who won 80% of the competition committee vote. In the overall weighted voting, Wright finished with 52% and Healy with 35% of the overall tabulations.

June 10, 2026: Taig Healy's goal at Westchester SC helps secure a 1-all draw that extends Fort Wayne Football Club's unbeaten streak in USL League One play to eight matches – the longest in the league all season to that point.

June 12, 2026: Fort Wayne Football Club's Aurie Echevarría wins Save of the Round, from Round 3 of the Prinx Tires USL Cup, for a save against Union Omaha. Fort Wayne FC has won all four fan votes in which they've had a nominee.

June 17, 2026: Ryan Becher scores in a 1-all tie at Forward Madison, extending Fort Wayne FC's unbeaten streak to nine matches – tied for the third longest run by a first-year club in USL League

One history. Bernd Schipmann also surpasses 200 career saves, making him the 10th USL League One player to do so.

June 20, 2026: Jack Thomas and Taig Healy both have a goal and an assist, and Bernd Schipmann has a four-save clean sheet, as Fort Wayne FC defeats the Richmond Kickers 2-0 on the road. Fort Wayne FC's unbeaten streak reaches 10 matches, which is tied for the second longest such streak by a first-year team in USL League One history with FC Naples' 2025 squad. The record of 12 straight matches without a loss by a first-year team was set by Lansing Ignite FC in 2019. Healy's eighth goal ties the club's career mark, including the team's time in the pre-professional level of USL League Two.

July 4, 2026: Fort Wayne FC defeats Spokane Velocity FC at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium, extending club's unbeaten streak to 11 matches in USL League One play – the second longest run by a first-year club in league history. Taig Healy scores his ninth goal with the club, becoming the club's career goal-scoring leader before the midway point of his first season with the club. The club held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the formal grand-opening of the stadium.

July 18, 2026: Lilian Ricol scores from 44 yards out in a 3-0 victory over Greenville Triumph SC at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium, giving him nine goals to tie him with Taig Healy for the club's all-time goal-scoring record regardless of competition or level. Also, Johnny Aye checks into the match and, at age 16, becomes the youngest ever to play for Fort Wayne FC in professional soccer. Aye holds all-time club record for youngest player, as he was 15 when he entered a match in 2025 in USL League Two.

Aug. 13, 2026: Lilian Ricol selected USL League One Player of the Month, the first time a Fort Wayne FC player has received the honor.

Aug. 14, 2026: Lilian Ricol is transferred to USL Championship's San Antonio FC, becoming the first Fort Wayne FC player to be sold. Terms of the agreement were not announced, but it was for a near-record amount for a USL League One player.

Aug. 28, 2026: Logan Neidlinger, a native of Indiana, becomes first player acquired by Fort Wayne FC on loan, when he is sent from USL Championship's Indy Eleven.

May 20, 2023: In 30th match in club history, its 50th goal is scored by Joe Kouadio – his second of match – in 31st minute; **Sebastian Chalbaud** also scores twice in 4-0 victory at FC Buffalo

August 1, 2023: Goalkeeper **Aurie Echevarría** becomes first member of club to win Golden Glove award for lowest goals-against average in USL League Two at 0.43 goals per 90 minutes

August 11, 2023: Fort Wayne FC defender **Reid Sproat** becomes first member of club to make All-League team

July 10, 2024: Club clinches second straight Valley Division title with 1-0 victory at Dayton Dutch Lions, as **Brandon Bermingham** scores in 87th minute

July 19, 2024: Club gets first postseason win with first ever penalty kick shootout after scoreless tie at Midwest United FC

July 21, 2024: For second straight year, club ousted from postseason by Flint City Bucks in 2-1 road loss in Central Conference semifinals

June 7, 2025: After allowing back-to-back goals to the Dayton Dutch Lions' Felix Ezekwuka to tie the match at 2 at Bishop D'Arcy Stadium, Fort Wayne FC's **Venton Evans** scores on a penalty kick in the 96th minute and **Hugo Garcia** adds a goal in the 98th for a 4-2 victory to take Fort Wayne FC to first place in the Valley Division

June 18, 2025: Fort Wayne FC takes five-point lead in Valley Division race with a 2-0 victory at Bishop D'Arcy Stadium over Lexington SC, getting goals from **Caio Oliveira** (penalty kick) and **Anthony Hernandez**

June 28, 2025: In an International Friendly against Atlas Fútbol Club's Sub-23 team at Bishop D'Arcy Stadium, **Jonny Aye**, 15, becomes the youngest player ever to enter a match for Fort Wayne FC

July 12, 2025: Fort Wayne FC clinches third straight Valley Division championship with 4-0 victory over Kings Hammer FC Cincinnati in FWFC's final match at Bishop D'Arcy Stadium, as Muslim Umar scores twice in front of a crowd of 1,712

July 18, 2025: After falling behind 2-0 in the first half, Fort Wayne FC rallies for a 3-2 overtime victory over Midwest United FC to advance to the Central Conference Semifinals, getting goals from captain **Tiago Dias** on a header, **Caio Oliveira** on a free kick, and **Amari Fowlkes** in overtime after an **Aboubacar Traore** pass across the box

July 20, 2025: Fort Wayne FC suffers heartbreaking 2-0 loss in Central Conference Semifinals to Flint City Bucks in Flint, Mich. Flint City's Donovan Phillip scores for a 1-0 lead in the 117th minute off the rebound of a Dominic Ayella penalty kick that had been stopped by Fort Wayne FC goalkeeper **Aurie Echevarría**. Ayella adds an insurance goal in the 124th minute, ending Fort Wayne FC's time in USL League Two

March 7, 2026: Fort Wayne FC plays first match in professional soccer, losing 2-0 to FC Naples in a closely contested USL League One outing in Naples, Florida. Ten of the 16 Fort Wayne FC players who entered the match were making their professional debuts. That included four players who had been with the club in pre-professional soccer: **Tiago Dias**, **Reid Sproat**, **Aurie Echevarría** and **Anthony Hernandez**

March 14, 2026: Fort Wayne FC's first goal in the professional ranks is scored by **Lilian Ricol** in the 30th minute of a match at the Sarasota Paradise. **Ryan Becher** also scores and Fort Wayne FC gets its first standings point in professional soccer with a 2-all tie

April 11, 2026: **Taig Healy** scores 44 seconds into match – establishing a new club record regardless of league – and Fort Wayne FC gets its first victory in professional soccer, 1-0 at the

Chattanooga Red Wolves SC. **Bernd Schipmann** has two saves for the 28th clean sheet of his USL League One Career – fourth most in league history

May 2, 2026: Fort Wayne FC opens its new stadium, Ruoff Mortgage Stadium, and plays the Charlotte Independence to a 2-2 draw. **Taig Healy** opened the scoring in the fourth minute. **Jayden Smith** put Fort Wayne FC up 2-1 in the 10th minute

May 6, 2026: Fort Wayne FC gets first victory at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium with a 3-0 victory over Portland Hearts of Pine that included two **Lilian Ricol** goals and a **Taig Healy** goal in the second half. Goalkeeper **Bernd Schipmann** assisted on a goal and had a four-save clean sheet in front of 2,389 fans

May 16, 2026: The first running of the Victory & Liberty Derby, a USL Cup match between Fort Wayne FC and USL Championship-side Indy Eleven, winds up tied 2-2 and then goes to penalty kicks, where Indy Eleven scored three of the four goals at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium. Fort Wayne FC's **Taig Healy** scored in regulation time for his fifth goal in six matches in all competitions. **Jack Thomas'** first professional goal, in stoppage time, forced the PKs.

July 4, 2026: A ribbon-cutting ceremony is held at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium to celebrate the formal grand-opening of the venue. Fort Wayne FC then defeats Spokane Velocity FC 3-0 and **Taig Healy** scores his ninth goal of his first professional season, making him the club's all-time leader in goal scoring.

July 18, 2026: Club holds inaugural **John Bellio** Tribute Night to Fight Cancer, honoring one of the club's original owners who died from the disease in 2025. **Lilian Ricol** scores from 44 yards out in 3-0 victory over Greenville Triumph SC and ties Taig Healy for club's all-time goal-scoring lead with nine goals, regardless of competition. **Johnny Aye** checked into the match at Ruoff Mortgage Stadium and became, at age 16, the youngest player to get on the field for Fort Wayne FC in a pro match. He holds the club's all-time record for youngest player, having appeared in a 2025 match at 15 when Fort Wayne FC was in USL League Two.

Aug. 14, 2026: **Lilian Ricol**, a striker who had just been named USL League One Player of the Month, is transferred to USL Championship's San Antonio FC, becoming the first Fort Wayne FC player to be sold. Terms of the agreement were not announced, but it was for a near-record amount for a USL League One player. Ricol had nine goals and two assists in 23 matches across all competitions for the club in his first pro season, leaving tied for the club's all-time goal-scoring lead.
